Pastor's Corner

October Devotion: The Rosary and Saint Joseph - Conclusion

Beloved Parishioners,

I wish to conclude the reflection started last week in this Pastor's Corner on the Rosary and St. Joseph. I hope the reflection helps you to enter into the habit of praying daily the rosary and honoring Saint Joseph, the husband of Mary and Foster Father of Jesus.

October became particularly associated with the Rosary after the Battle of Lepanto in 1571, where Christians, invoking the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary through the Rosary, achieved a significant naval victory against the Ottoman Empire. The Battle of Lepanto, fought on October 7, 1571, was a crucial naval engagement between the Holy League, a coalition of Christian states, and the Ottoman Empire. During the 16th century, the Ottoman Empire was expanding aggressively into Europe, threatening Christian territories and maritime trade routes. The rise of Ottoman power prompted fears among European nations, leading to the formation of the Holy League, which included Spain, the Papal States, and the Venetian Republic. Pope Pius V played a pivotal role in organizing the Holy League, rallying support from various European powers.

The naval battle between the Holy League and the Ottoman troops took place near Lepanto, a port in western Greece. The tide turned in favor of the Holy League, resulting in a decisive victory. In recognition of the battle's significance, Pope Pius V established the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, celebrated on October 7th, to commemorate the victory and the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Rosary was seen as a powerful prayer that had contributed to the success of the Holy League. More so, this feast equally promotes the Rosary as a means of spiritual warfare and intercession.

The month of October calls us to reflect on the mysteries of the Rosary and we must understand that the rosary is not merely a repetitive prayer but a meditative journey through the key events of salvation history. Each decade represents an opportunity to contemplate the joys, sorrows, glories, and luminous events in the lives of Jesus

and Mary and furnishes us with ample graces. Further, the practice of praying the Rosary fosters community and family bonds. Parishes like ours often organize communal Rosary prayers during this period which help strengthen the faith of the parishioners. In our parish community here at Our Lady of the Lake, the rosary is said daily at 7:30 am before Mass. We have also the rosary makers who promote the daily recitation of the rosary and produce rosaries sent to different parts of the world. On my personal level, I say my rosary every day during my daily adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Therefore, I encourage that in our various families, we pray the rosary together during this period because it instills a sense of shared faith and spiritual growth among our members, especially our children. What is more? The Rosary also serves as a tool for intercession. We believe in the efficacious power of Mary's intercession, thus asking her to present our petitions to her Son profits us more and reflects our understanding of the communion of saints, where the faithful on earth can seek the prayers of those in heaven. May Our Lady, through the Rosary, help us win many of our lives' battles. Amen.

Finally, my beloved parishioners, last month I made a passionate appeal to you about the emergency situation of our air conditioning units which are on the brink of breaking down completely. In my appeal I mentioned that we are seeking about \$240,000.00 to fix the problem. There was a family who had talked to me about helping with a large sum but for reasons they are no longer coming forth with the offer. Many of you have made some donations but that is not near what we are looking for. As of today, we have got about \$13,000.00. I appeal once again to you all as this air conditioning unit is an emergency and needs to be fixed. We are only lucky that winter is coming but we would need to place the order as soon as possible to be able to have it here before next summer. Whatever you can donate to this urgent appeal would be highly appreciated.

Theme: To Lay One's Life for Others

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B, October 20, 2024

First Reading: Isaiah 53:10-11, Second Reading: Hebrews 4:14-16, Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

Isaiah's prophesy in the first reading and the Gospel of Mark call our attention to the fact that true greatness is rooted in service to others. Jesus exemplifies this when He says I have not come to be served but to serve and give My life as a ransom for many. The second reading tells us that the Son of God was not afraid to come down to our human level. He demonstrated the depth of His love by sharing with our human condition. Thus, we should be confident to approach Him as we are without any shame or fear since He is not afraid to call us His brothers and sisters.

The reading from the Gospel of Mark presented to us today is also told in Matthew's Gospel Mt 20:20-28. One revealing difference in the account of the two stories is that Mark tells us that it was James and John who made the request to Jesus while in Matthew's account it was their mother. The reason is probably that Matthew, writing twenty-five years after Mark had written, did not want to present James and John as people of worldly ambition. To conceal this aspect of their human nature Matthew puts it in the mouth of their mother.

William Barclay a Biblical scholar says that this passage of Mark's gospel is one of the most revealing passages of the New Testament. It reveals a lot about the person of Jesus Christ and the apostles. The apostles are men with all the human weaknesses and thus thinking in a human way. They were more focused on personal ambition, success, and reward without any thought of sacrifice. The passage reveals that the apostles completely failed to understand their master Jesus. The height of their lack of understanding was the time of the request by the

apostles. The request of positions at the right and left side of Jesus was made at a very critical moment of Jesus' life when He was talking of going to Jerusalem to die. The anger of the other ten apostles is evidence that they too were interested in the position as James and John were.

However, Jesus was patient and never lost patience with them but rather was able to accommodate them despite their worldly ambition. He still believed in them and trusted in them that they would at last become good disciples. This tells us that Jesus does not write anyone off but embraces each person with open arms once we come to Him. May we never write people off but like Jesus learn the act of kindness and patience. May we never write ourselves off since Jesus never writes anyone off.

For Jesus, true greatness is found in service to others and not in lording it over others. Jesus teaches the value of patience and at the same time calls us to see service as a means to achieve greatness. We serve others when we give our time, energy, and talent for the good of others. We are at the service of others when we take certain volunteer commitments in the church and in our local community. Service should not be understood to mean menial jobs as the types done by servants, but service can be any noble and unselfish act done for the interest of the other. It could be our daily tasks taken as God's will for us. It is a profound truth that whenever we do our daily tasks with a great sense of diligence, dedication and justice, we serve others well

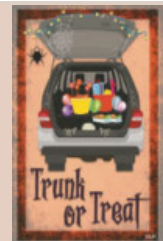

Director of Liturgy and Music - Fulltime Position 40 hours/week with benefits

The Director of Liturgy and Music is responsible for developing, planning, coordinating, and directing all liturgical celebrations and music ministries. The role involves collaborating with clergy, staff, and volunteers to ensure that worship services are conducted with reverence and are musically enriched in line with the liturgical traditions of the Church. The director will also work to foster active participation in the liturgy through music and prayer, nurturing both musicians and the congregation.

Liturgical Planning duties include planning, organizing, and executing all liturgical celebrations, including but not limited to weekend Masses, feast days, Holy Week, Advent, Christmas, Easter, and other special liturgies. Will collaborate with the clergy and liturgical teams to ensure cohesive and spiritually enriching liturgies. Coordinate schedules for lectors, Eucharistic ministers, altar servers, and other liturgical ministries.

Music Ministry includes selecting appropriate music for all liturgical services, ensuring alignment with liturgical seasons, readings, and themes. Will recruit, train, and direct choir members, cantors, and musicians for various Masses and special occasions. Includes preparing music ministers for rehearsals and performances, ensuring quality and liturgical appropriateness. Will lead the congregation in musical worship, encouraging active participation.

Qualifications consist of a Bachelor's or Master's Degree in Liturgy, Music, Theology, or related field, proficiency in playing a musical instrument (e.g., organ, piano, or guitar) and leading vocal ensembles, strong understanding of Catholic liturgy and sacred music, experience in planning and leading liturgical celebrations, strong leadership and communication skills, with the ability to work collaboratively with clergy, staff, and volunteers, ability to manage multiple projects and meet deadlines, and commitment to fostering spiritual growth through liturgy and music.

Pastoral Letter from the Most Reverend John P. Dolan
October 7, 2024, Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There is no love like that of a mother. A mother who cares tenderly, anticipates our needs, leads us along the way and is a safe place to land in all of the ups and downs of life. In the Diocese of Phoenix we have a magnificent patroness, Our Lady of Guadalupe, who is this mother to each one of us.

She is the same mother who, almost 500 years ago, appeared to Juan Diego on Tepeyac hill in modern day Mexico City, inviting him to boldly ask the local bishop that a church be built in her honor. The same mother whose image miraculously appeared on Juan Diego's tilma, which millions of pilgrims still visit every year, and who has become the greatest evangelizer in the Americas.

What moves my heart is *how* she appeared to Juan Diego, and in turn the whole Aztec people – she spoke their dialect, wore traditional garb and communicated through symbols that were personal to their culture. She also spoke to Juan Diego affectionally, calling him "Juanito, Juan Dieguito."

In this same, tender way, she calls each one of us her sons and daughters, inviting us into the protective folds of her mantle. And just like Juan Diego's simple tilma, she desires to transform us into image bearers of Christ and great evangelizers of her motherly love.

Inspired by Our Lady of Guadalupe, I have developed a seven-year pastoral plan on evangelization, which will begin in January 2025 and lead up to December 9, 2031 – the 500th anniversary of Our Lady's apparitions on Tepeyac hill.

Several considerations moved me to build out this plan: the new evangelization, particularly in the Americas, those on the peripheries, the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20), diocesan statistical analysis, tensions within our world and keeping up with Arizona growth, among others.

Each year has a theme; most are based on the apparitions of Our Lady of Guadalupe and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' National Pastoral Plan, "Missionary Disciples Going Forth with Joy": 2025 Year of Hope, 2026 El Camino Real, 2027 Animated by Christ, 2028 That We May Be One, 2029 Renewed in Trust, 2030 The Encounter Moment and 2031 Go Forth in Joy.

Each of the six years following the Jubilee Year I look forward to sharing a pastoral letter, delving into the theme and sharing practical ideas on evangelization for discernment and implementation on a personal, parish and diocesan level. We will also turn in a particular way to our Hispanic and Latino brothers and sisters, who are a great gift to the Church, and their example of deep devotion, rich traditions and familial love.

Year one of the pastoral plan will carry the theme "Year of Hope" in tandem with Pope Francis proclaiming 2025 the Jubilee Year of Hope. This is the perfect theme to begin our seven-year walk with Our Lady, who always leads us to Jesus, our Savior and our Hope.

Pope Francis has proposed "10 Hopes" which I invite you to consider in a particular way during this Year of Hope: Hope for peace over division, hope for enthusiasm for life and a readiness to share it, hope for the openness to life and responsible parenthood, hope for prisoners through restorative justice, hope for the sick and those dedicated to their care, hope for youth and young adults, hope for immigrants, migrants and refugees, hope for the elderly, hope for the poor and the hungry and hope for greater Christian unity.

This is a wonderful opportunity for an introspective moment. Before we set out to evangelize, we might ask ourselves, *"How am I being called to accompany others who are made in the image and likeness of God, especially the marginalized, who carry these crosses?"*

The Jubilee Year of Hope carries several opportunities for a plenary indulgence, beginning with visiting the holy doors in Rome. Additionally, I have decreed the following churches in the Diocese of Phoenix Jubilee sites during the Jubilee Year: Ss. Simon and Jude Cathedral (Phoenix), St. Mary's Basilica (downtown Phoenix), St. Anthony's (Gila River Indian Community), St. Mary's (Kingman), Sacred Heart (Prescott) and Chapel of the Holy Cross (Sedona).

A webpage is being created and will be available before the Advent season. It will be a one-stop shop for all information regarding the seven-year pastoral plan on evangelization, including access to the pastoral plan and information on the nature and conditions of indulgences and obtaining an indulgence during the Year of Hope. More to come in the following months at catholicsun.org

The title of this pastoral letter is inspired by an acronym of the word "TILMA," which expresses my hope and personal invitation to each one of you: *Testifica, oh Iglesia, a la Luz del Misterio del Amor* (*Testify, o Church, to the Light of the Mystery of Love*)

I am delighted to journey with you through these seven years. As we go forward, let us find great hope in the words Our Lady spoke to Juan Diego, the same words she speaks to each one of us:

"Am I not here, I who am your Mother? ... Are you not in the hollow of my mantle, in the crossing of my arms? Do you need something more? Let nothing else worry you or disturb you."

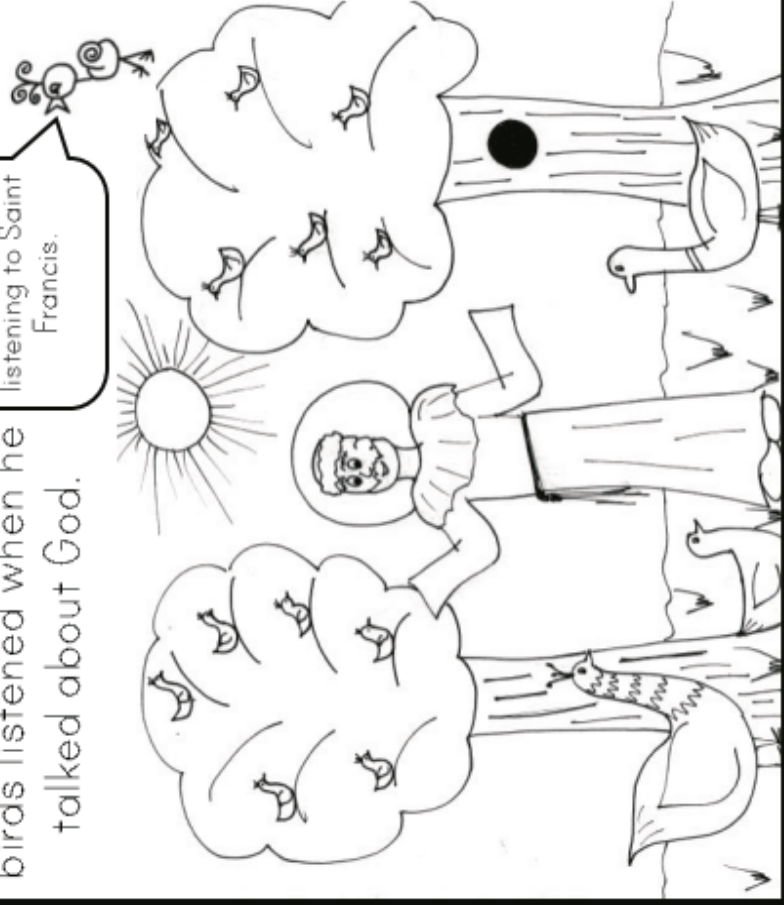
Saint Francis of Assisi
